Glass Plate Negatives Give Historical View of Boothe

Ten 8x10 Glass Plate Negatives were donated to Friends of Boothe last year. We were able to have them scanned and digitized by a Historical Society friend and professional photographer, Roger Salls.

What exactly is a glass plate negative? Well, as opposed to the type of thin, flexible negatives you may be familiar with, glass plate negatives are exactly what they sound like: a negative printed on a glass plate. They consist of a glass plate with a light sensitive emulsion fixed to it with a binding agent, which when exposed to light through a camera, creates an image.

Wet glass plate negatives were developed in 1851. The dry plate negatives in 1871. In the 1920's they were replaced by the gelatin, or celluloid roll film that was used until the computerization of photography in the late 1950's. Considering that glass plate negatives are very fragile, the condition of these donated negatives was amazing. When they arrived to us they were still in the original box that the film came in, separated by old newspaper clippings. One of them mentioned President Woodrow Wilson.

In the photo here we see what the original Clocktower looked like. According to our Clocktower historian Steve Korosh:

This is a very early image; my guess would be right around 1915-16. The Rose Windows had not yet been installed, nor the front entry porch, and most of the windows and doors on the barn section have been relocated or eliminated since this photo was made. It also shows the "birdcage" atop the



cupola, which was dismantled after a storm many decades ago. Judging by the subtle variations in gray tones in the black-and-white image, this photo shows the original paint scheme of mustard yellow with white trim on the barn, and barn red on the lower portion of the tower. I'm not sure if the upper portion of the tower, above the observation deck, was also barn red, or went back to yellow Interestingly, the counterweight rods are missing from the clock hands. I guess they had not yet realized that they needed to balance the weight of the hands to make the clock run more efficiently. And it looks like the balls atop the corner posts on the tower railings (and the bird cage) were gilded in this image. So many changes from the Clock Tower we now know.

Holiday Open House

When the Friends of Boothe decked the halls of the homestead in the first weekend of December, they went all out.
